

Superintendent's Corner

At the Logan County Board of Developmental Disabilities, just as our motto says, "Together We Grow", we offer services and supports to span a lifetime. Starting at birth, Early Intervention is there. Preschool at the Discovery Center follows, which leads into school and transition aged Service and Support Administration (SSA). When graduation nears young adults will continue to receive SSA and begin the LCBDD funded RISE program. This program prepares them for Integrated Employment and other Adult Services including Special Olympics, Advocacy Support, and Future Planning. Currently we serve almost 600 people who we continually encourage to move toward community integration, independence, employment, and self-advocacy.

2023 marks the 18th year of operating without any additional levy dollars. We continue to develop and maintain sound fiscal practices, operating at some of the lowest costs in the state. We employ 58 dedicated staff who genuinely care about those we serve. Several staff changes have taken place this year. I started as Superintendent in January, and we hired a new Business Director in May. Our agency received the highest level of compliance during our accreditation review. The amount of people we support has been in a pattern of growth for several years, however we have been very conservative with hiring practices. Staff retention is a top priority in the current economic climate.

We continue to collaborate with local communities for playground projects to increase inclusion so children with disabilities can play alongside their peers. Recently, we partnered with the Villages of West Liberty and West Mansfield to create more inclusive playgrounds. A universal changing table was acquired this year to enhance the dignity, independence, and allow for privacy for people with disabilities, so the worry of finding an accessible restroom at community events can be eliminated. The universal changing table was set up at the Logan County Fair and was utilized by many.

I am truly proud of the work our team does and to live in a supportive, caring community. Thank you Logan County for allowing us to serve people with developmental disabilities. 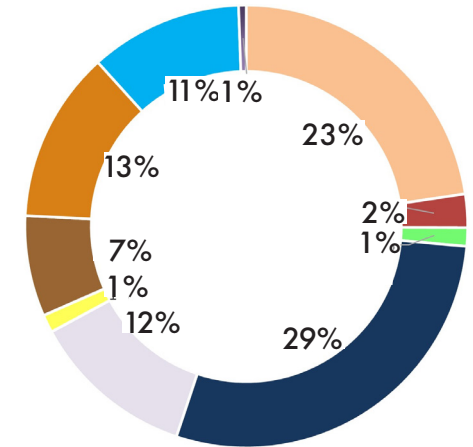

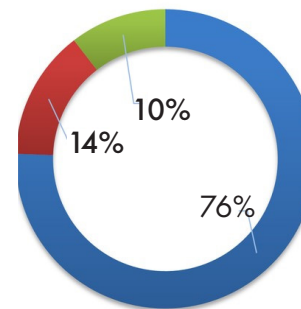
STUDENTS SERVED AT THE DISCOVERY CENTER WITH 96 STUDENTS RECEIVING SPEECH THERAPY

Keeping Families Together

A Keeping Families Together Grant was awarded to LCBDD through the Ohio Department of Developmental Disabilities. The purpose of this grant is to assist youth with complex needs and their families. KFT funds can be used for supporting families through provider support, environmental needs, service access, local collaboration, county board staff support, or crisis and emergency options through the year 2025. LCBDD will receive \$25,375 in Fiscal Year 2024 and \$21,750 in Fiscal Year 2025 for a total of \$47,125.
